Internet Safety in School

Internet safety falls under both the ICT and PSHE curriculum. In ICT, there is a separate line of planning for internet safety and each year group has a different aspect of internet use to focus on.

Year R- understand where and who to go to for help.

Year 1– Use technology safely and keep password private.

Year 2– Recognise acceptable and unacceptable behaviours online

The subjects the children discuss slowly progress as they go through the school and the teachers tailor their lessons to the needs of the children in the class.

Social Media

- Make sure you know your child's passwords
- Join yourself and be 'friends' with your child
- Be open and honest about content
- Apply 'Stranger Danger' to online use
- Find out age restrictions

Internet
